Introduction

Part I - "Work of Art"

Part II — Reading

Assignment — The typical AP summer coursework has you read two books

(2 books x 200 pages = 400 pages) and write an essay or two. For our summer coursework, you will read four short stories and one poem (19 pages) and no essays.

Easy peasy! (But you have to do it.) After reading the four stories and one poem, you will record some of the decisions the authors made. (More details in your digital notebook)



Part III - Reading (Optional)

Optional Assignment — Read any novel on the National Book Award list or the list of Pulitzer Prize winners for fiction from the past 20 years (links below). You can click on the book titles to learn a bit more about each book. These books are considered "best books of the year." Reading one of these books (is something a mature reader would do, but also) will prepare you to be more successful in this course.
